Deb Stoner is an artist with deep roots in craft, as well as fine art photography. Deb's work in photography involves growing plants, collecting insects, and choreographing the still life image. She holds a MFA in Applied Design/Metals from SDSU, BS Geology from UC Davis, and decades long teaching career in the Metals Department at Oregon College of Art and Craft. Deb is known for her work in designing and making eyewear from a jeweler's point of view, for developing new ideas in eyewear for the fashion industry, and for teaching those ideas to students in over fifty workshops at craft centers worldwide. Deb's dedication to her career as a photographer has been noticed by collectors, critics and jurors: she recently spoke at the 2018 Yuma Symposium, to the Portland Art Museum in March 2018; had a 3 month solo exhibition with Vernissage Fine Art; was a Critical Mass finalist in 2015; a speaker at the 2015 SPE NW Regional Conference; had a solo show at Camerawork Gallery; a year-long solo exhibit "A Year in the Willamette Valley" at the Portland International Airport resulting in acquisition of 12 pieces for the Port of Portland's permanent art collection; juried purchases for large scale works in the public art collections at University of Oregon, OHSU, and Portland Community College; recipient of RACC grant for participation at the Medium Portfolio Reviews in San Diego; as well as selling work to a growing list of collectors.
